



This new transcription project from Virginia Tech features records from the U.S. National Archives: a remarkable collection of more than 65,000 handwritten reflections by U.S. soldiers who fought during the Second World War.

Throughout WWII, the U.S. War Department collected tens of thousands of these anonymous commentaries from men & women who shared their uncensored & personal reflections on wartime military service. By transcribing soldiers' handwritten responses, you are helping to give voice to the soldiers of World War II.
