**March 8**

### ***Introduction to U.S. Federal Census Records***

Census Records are often the building blocks for your genealogical research. Come learn about the Federal Census Records of 1790 to 1940. Staff will provide an overview of these resources as well as tips for tracing ancestors from one decade to the next.

**April 12**

### ***Introduction to Passenger Arrival Records***

Immigration records, also known as “ship passenger arrival records,” may provide genealogists with a wealth of information for persons arriving in the New York area as early as 1820. Come learn how to navigate these records.

**May 10**

### ***Introduction to Naturalization Records***

Also known as citizenship records, these later records can often provide detailed information about a person’s legal entry into the U.S. Come learn strategies for searching these records and learning more about your immigrant ancestor.

**June 14**

### ***Introduction to Military Records***

The National Archives maintains all military service records beginning with the Revolutionary War. Join staff as they provide an overview of Military Service Records and how to order copies of records. This session will also include a broad overview on how to locate other Military records within our holdings.
