SUBJECT: Pedro Luis DIAZ Lanz

The following answers were given me by Reichhardt and are keyed to the questions you wanted asked of him concerning Subject:

1. Did he ever see DIAZ Lanz alone?

YES.

2. Did he see him as often as he wanted to?

YES.

3. Under what circumstances did he see him?

In the INS offices in Miami, both alone and in the presence of INS officers.

4. Was he ever denied access to him?

NO.

5. Did he have a chance to debrief him fully? Could he have done so?

It was not possible to debrief DIAZ fully for two reasons. His state of mind while being held in the INS offices in Miami was not conducive to a proper debriefing; and there was not enough time to obtain requirements from Headquarters. DIAZ was given a good preliminary debriefing by the FBI immediately after his arrival, and a thorough debriefing was possible only under different circumstances and with detailed requirements. There was no denial by INS, other than as the result of the circumstances, of access to DIAZ, who theoretically could have been debriefed.
